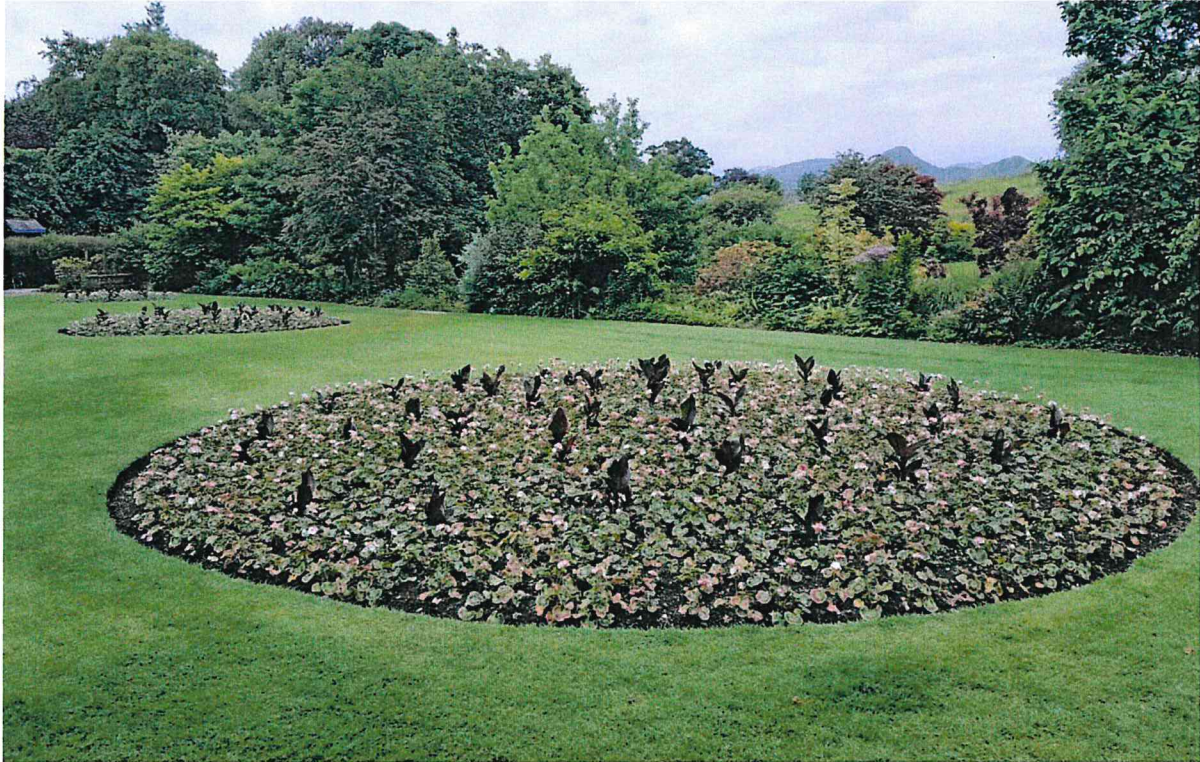

Parks Manager Report July 2026**Christine Fawcett**

The weather over the last two months has been dry for the most of May and wet and warm in June. Thanks, must go to the parks staff for their hard work and commitment and also to the three ladies from the office for their energy and support.

Hope Park

The summer bedding has all been planted out and is growing nicely to provide a colourful display that includes pink geraniums and bronze, scarlet canas.



Half term week was very busy within both parks with fantastic weather. It was difficult at time to keep on top of the sheer volume of litter within the parks despite the litter bins being emptied twice a day. Trade waste collections had to be increased to accommodate this volume of litter.

The pitch and putt is looking well given the dry spell and all the play it is experiencing. All of the putting greens have been treated with liquid iron to improve root growth and plant health. An application of summer fertilizer has been applied in mid May and a further application will be given in July to withstand the footfall and aid recovery. But is has been a while since we had hail stones in mid June!



It's unfortunate to have to report vandalism within the parks again, this time at Hope Park. The water bowser has been tampered with, including water and dirt being put into the fuel tank. A CCTV camera is now in place to help deter further damage. Damage was also reported at the underpass and golf kiosk.

I met the local PCSO Holly Cleal on Wednesday 17th June and we had a walk around both Lower and Upper Fitz Park discussing various problems we are having. We both agreed having a police presence has a great effect on deterring vandalism and she and her colleagues are hoping to carry out more regular patrols within the parks and visit Keswick School.

Upper Fitz Park

Public games are now in operation everyday through Café HNW. The tennis club is using the courts for both club matches and junior training sessions and play on the grass courts is popular.

Verti-cutting has been carried out across the bowling green and tennis courts to remove thatch. This will be carried out again in July as time allows. The ongoing repairs to the playing surfaces are being carried out on a weekly basis to get the turf surface through the season.

An application of liquid iron and liquid seaweed has been applied to aid with disease and help keep the turf healthy.

Given the heat wave we had in mid-June the grass surface is holding up very well.



Shrubs are being pruned and shaped around the park on a regular basis to keep footpaths clear. The beds are also being weeded and edged to keep the park looking tidy.



A tree walk/tour with the Lake District Planning Board Tree Officer Lucy Sanders has been organized for Tuesday 14th July at 5pm. This is about discussing trees and tree health around Upper Fitz Park. The walk will begin at the main gates to Upper Fitz Park, everyone is welcome.

MUGA Flood lights

Unfortunately, three of the six floodlights on the Multi Use Games Area have become faulty. Each light has four lighting elements within each of the floodlights. Two of these elements have blown in each light. Our electrician has enquired to see if we can replace these elements, but they are unavailable. So the only option is to replace the complete flood light.

A quote has been received to replace these floodlights with cost being £2584.00 plus vat.

A cherry picker will also be required from Eric Nicholson @ £320.00

Would the trustees please consider replacing these lights before the winter months close in. Access to the flood lights requires hard ground conditions to support the cherry picker. I would suggest we use funds from the future development fund to keep this facility up and running for forthcoming years.

Use of the Parks

Update on Binfluencers banner

Jean, Christine and myself met with a member of the Binfluencers and the artist of the proposed banner and sculptures to work out the best placement for the installation. The sculptures are much smaller than I think we anticipated, and after discussion, we have decided that the location will be to place it on the railings closest to the entrance to the park. This will give the biggest impact for visitors to the park, and will allow it to be somewhat protected. The installation date is looking to be around the 15th July (to be confirmed), and there will be social media surrounding this – I will pass on any information I have closer to the date.

Lost and Found in the Lakes

The Trust, through Café Hope, was approached recently by a production company working for the BBC, who have requested whether they can use Hope Park to film in, as they were approached by someone who had lost something on the path which runs mainly along the edges of Hope Park, and requested if they could film there. After consideration, we have gone back with the following, as well as the fact that they will ensure that a disclaimer is made that metal detecting is not encouraged, and that they have been granted specific permission by the land owners.

- Digging by metal detectorists is something that we are generally trying to discourage in all of our parks, but if you are happy to provide a disclaimer that would be acceptable, if we could see it in advance. As insurance, we would ask for a bond of £500 to be payable prior to the event and held by the Trust until confirmation has been received from the Parks Manager, after the event, that no damage has been caused. – ***THIS ELEMENT IS PAYABLE BY CASH/CHEQUE OR SUPPLYING US WITH A CREDIT/DEBIT CARD NUMBER***
- No trampling or digging in the flower beds - our parks staff spend a great deal of time on those, and I would hate to see their work be upended.
- Copy of your risk assessment and public liability
- As Hope Park is a charity, we would appreciate a small donation to the upkeep of the park, even if it is just £100.

Given the potential time scales involved, we are happy (as are the producers with the proposed conditions) for this to go ahead. Trustees are asked to confirm this.

Berghaus Shoot

We have been contacted by a location manager on behalf of Berghaus, who are intending to do a shoot in Keswick and the surrounding areas, wishing to use Fitz Park for the fashion shoot, which will be on 13 July 2026, from 7-10am.

Given the short time frame, I have spoken to Christine and Catherine, and we are happy to allow this – they are willing to pay £375+VAT (half the full day rate, which I think is fair), as well as allow access to the parking for 3 vehicles for the duration of the shoot. I have requested their

risk assessment and copy of their public liability in order for us to have that on file. Trustees need to ratify this.

Forty Farms

I was approached by Simon Stephens at Theatre by the Lake. A new show in September will be The Farmer's Wife, which is inspired by Helen Rebanks' memoir. They are looking to partner with Amy Bateman to deliver the Forty Farms exhibition at the theatre, which also has an outdoor element. Simon asked the question of whether we would be interested in featuring this as a trail in either Fitz or Hope Park, during August, through to mid-October as a way of animating the public realm with a place-based cultural offering. The Theatre are willing to foot the bill for this, and I have had sight of the relevant paperwork (PLI and risk assessment).

I think this would be a great opportunity to work with the Theatre on something that has toured the county, and could increase footfall through September up until the half term until October.

I have enclosed information regarding this, and Trustees are asked if they are willing to go forward with this.

GB Ultra event

I have been approached by GB Ultras, who are seeking to host an Ultramarathon in Keswick on Saturday 24 October, with a set up day on Friday 23 October, using Fitz Park as a base. They are happy with all our costs, and have sent through details of their equipment, and things such as ballast and wind tolerances for the main gantry, as well as sending through their event plan. They are also starting to work with Cumberland Council with regard to a SAG form.

Trustees are asked if we are happy to allow this event to base itself in Fitz Park at the usual charges of £125+VAT for set up day, and £750+VAT (plus £1.50+VAT per competitor over 750 total). I see no issues with this, and the director has been very easily to deal with.

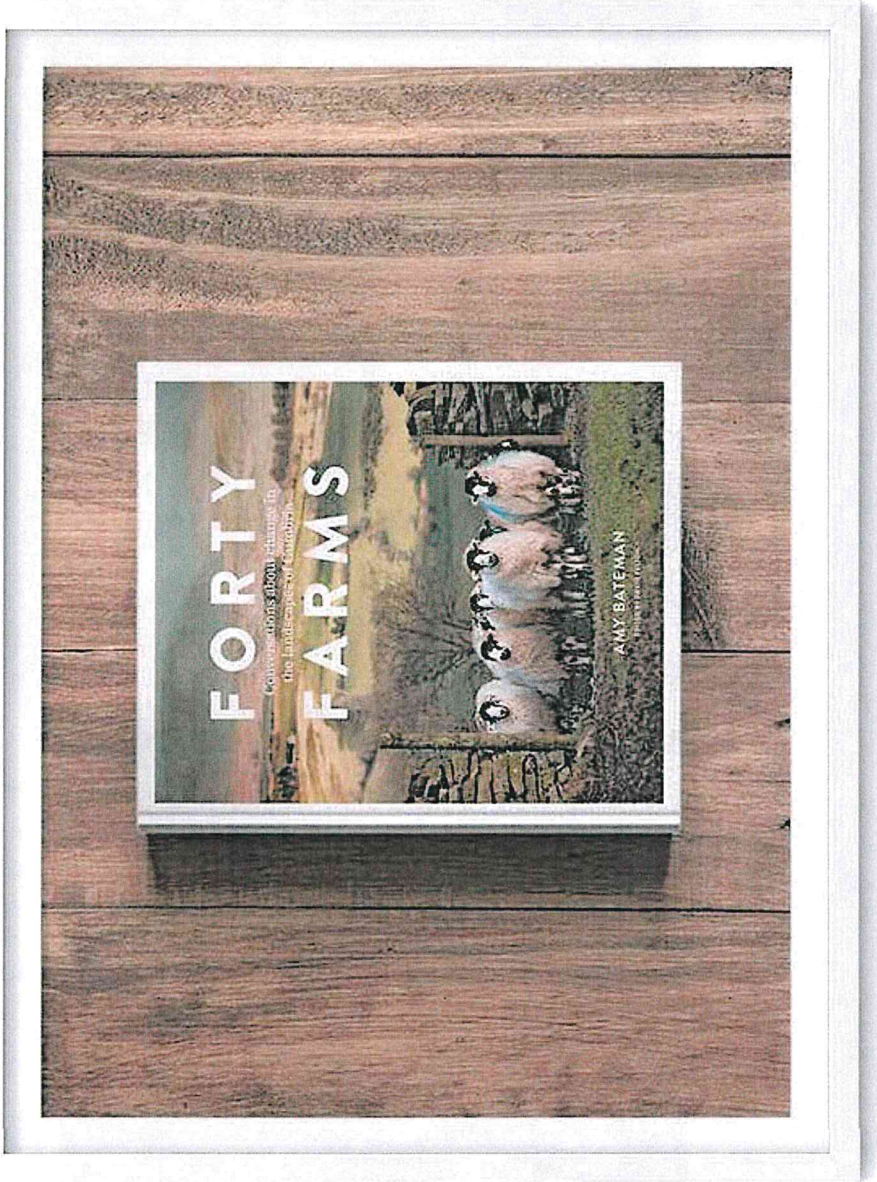
Keswick Tourism Association – Tour de France year to go event

This event will then move to Café HNW, who have extended their licence for the evening, and are providing live music. KTA are hiring two toilets, which will be placed in Lower Fitz Park, with the agreement of Christine, as there is only one toilet in Café HNW which is not enough. They are also borrowing bins from us to use. In return, KTA are having some posters and information about the Play Area appeal, and are seeking to raise some funds for it

I have seen risk assessments for this, and I am still concerned that it was done very much last minute, however what is done is done. We will ensure that if something like this happens moving forward, we will have more control over this, and appropriate forms are filled out.

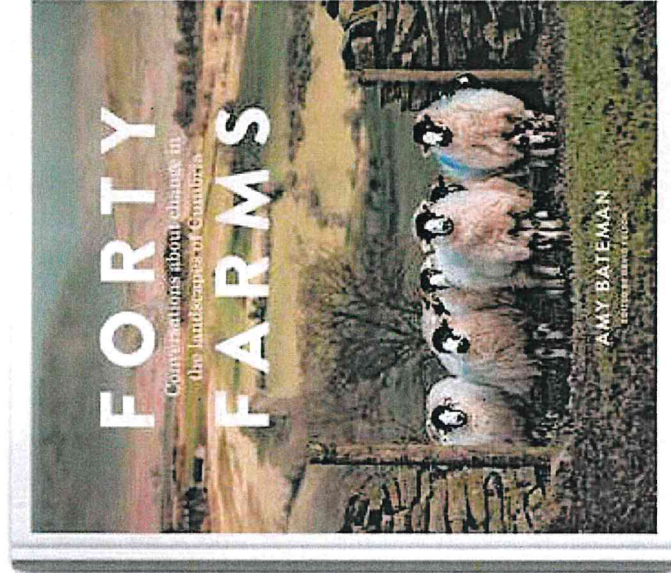

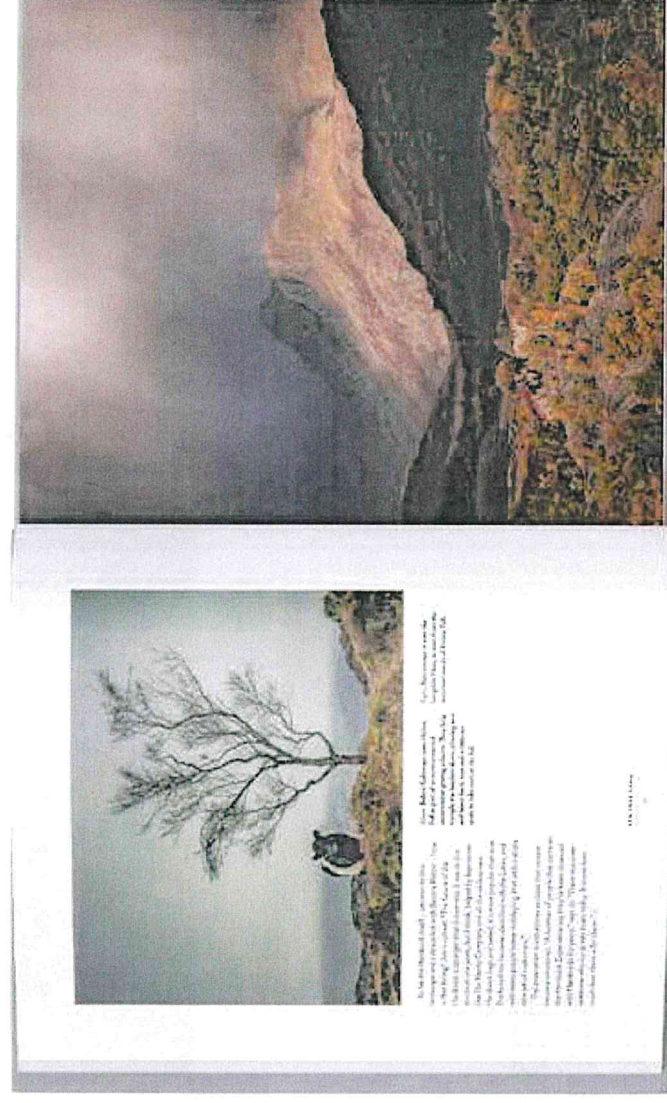
OUTDOORS EXHIBITION
