The Chair welcomed Vivien Little into her new role as Clerk of the Trust, and thanked Lynda Walker for all her help and assistance. The Chair also thanked all those who worked on the reopening of the playground area, especially the Parks Manager and her staff.

76. Parks Manager's Report

Consideration was given to the report of the Parks Manager who added that the clock in Hope Park had now been repaired, and thanked the contractor for their assistance. She also stated that with help from the Woodland Trust, there were now 250 trees planted in Fitz Park in land allocated for that purpose. Keswick Museum: Proposal to Keswick Town Council

Our team is very excited to be reopening again on the 17th May and are looking forward to seeing our visitors return to us this summer. We have several very exciting exhibitions this year, a big community engagement project supporting those with long term health problems and particularly long covid planned, as well as our popular lunch time talks and children's activities such as storytelling and crafts.

As with most museums we are restricted as to how many people we can welcome into our galleries at a time, so we are focusing on delivering as much of our activities and engagement programme outdoors as possible. We would like the make the most of our location at the heart of Fitz Park and celebrate the intentions of the civic planners who designed the Park and Museum to be a reciprocal draw for visitors.

Two of the key projects we are developing for this summer would benefit from working in partnership with the Town Council to provide the best visitor experience. These small steps would be significant to our ability to take Keswick Museum beyond the building walls and making links with our town and community.

Fox and Badger Trail

We are developing a children's activity trail around Fitz Park which will encourage them to find out more about the area. The intention is that the children collect a free activity pack with the printed trail map, the activities, a pencil and prize from the Museum and then use this to explore Fitz Park. It would be ideal if we could have physical markers around Fitz park for the children to find to increase their interaction with the park grounds and create a sense of discovery.

I have already approached Christine with this idea, and we would work with her to ensure that the signs are located in places that wouldn't pose any harm to the planting or impede maintenance. The intention is that they would be discreet so as not to detract from other park user's experience but visible from path for children looking out for them.

We would like to build 8 small wooden signs, with a display surface no bigger than A4, each of which would have our Fox and Badger illustration stencilled onto them in environmentally friendly paint. These would be easily removed once the trail has ended.

We are hoping to run this trail over the summer holidays, when there will be many families visiting Keswick.

Outdoor Gallery

We have also been developing a temporary outdoor gallery to engage with visitors who aren't feeling confident about returning to our indoor galleries yet. This will consist of around 5 interpretation panels exploring the importance of civic town planning to this area of Keswick. Making the link between the railway and station, Fitz Park, Keswick Museum and Station Road as the main route into the centre of town. This temporary outdoor gallery area will increase our free provision and not be restricted to access only during our opening hours.

We will be making use of the most underutilised part of the museum footprint: the courtyard garden area outside the Crosthwaite Room, to the right of the café outdoor seating. Our best option to create this gallery space is to build bespoke interpretation boards that will be attached to the railings that mark the boundary between the museum and Lower Fitz Park. It is my understanding that these railings are owned by the Town Council so we need permission to attach our temporary interpretation boards.

Pictured below is our prototype interpretation board, attached to the railings, that offers us a low-cost way of engaging with visitors. The design is lightweight but secure and robust enough to last into the autumn.

Thankfully we have had some drier weather in April, although cold at times spring is on its way. Thanks, must goes to all the staff for their continued hard work within the parks and office. Welcome to Vivien Little our new Town clerk, I hope you enjoy working with us at Keswick Town Council and in the parks.

Hope Park

Games reopened on the 29th March despite the heavy rain over the weekend and the park being under water for 3 days.



The greens have all been fertilized in the second week of March and are starting to grow despite the cold conditions. Moss has had a good winter season and this has been treated with an application of lawn sand, Light scarifying will be carried out on the greens to

remove the moss. An application of liquid iron has been applied April to improve root growth and add colour to the greens.

With sunshine coming out, it has given us the opportunity to fit the new sundial kindly donated by Dr Leonard Will.

Leonard joined me in the park to fit the sundial and it is now reading true Keswick time. A sign has been mounted on the plinth to explain how this works.

Thank you, Leonard, for your kind donation and bringing this back to life again.

It has been unfortunate that the sundial has had to be repaired less than a month after fitting due to the gnomon coming loose.



The bedding plants have arrived in early April and are being grow on in the glass house to be planted in early June

The tulips have provided a lovely display in late April and May and thrived in the dry spell we have had. Varieties include Grand perfection, Jan van nes and Red riding hood.

With the success of the wild flower meadow within the Fairtrade border last year, we have chosen to sow another wild flower mix in a new area opposite Hope park café, to the left of the 1st green.

Last year the mix was the "Classic mix" supplied by Pictorial Meadows and the same has been planted this year.

Three memorial benches have been fitted and one memorial tree at Hope park and two memorial benches fitted in Upper Fitz park.

This is snippet of an email I received from a local resident recently.

"Thanks for all the work that you do in the parks. They always look very well cared for and that pleases me enormously. I spent a lot of time in Hope Park during the lockdowns, and it never failed to lift my spirits. Please pass my thanks on to your team."

Townsfield


The grass has been cut in mid-April and will be cut twice a month for the growing season. The branches around the street light have been removed, along with a tree limb over the river footpath as recommended by the independent tree report. Two silver birch trees have also been removed due to lack of growth and their close proximity to the main road and footpath. A section of the brambles has been cut back to allow them to grow from the ground again and produce new growth.



Lower Fitz Park


In internal seating area within the play area has been revamped and made more user friendly including new edging boards to retain the bark mulch playing surface.

New bearings have been fitted in the roundabout and spinning bowl. This due to wear and tear and sand penetrating the wearing parts. The two large wheelie bins at the entrance to the play area will been replaced with three smaller black plastic bins. These bins are the same size as the other park bins and are not as heavy to empty when full.



1200L bins per week to deal with the increased litter/ waste volume in the park. In previous years we have not had to go too three collections until July. Contingently will be needed to cover the extra cost of waste collections if they high visitor number continue throughout the summer.





Several trees will be dead wooded below Knight's bridge and some hung up branches will be removed from the oak trees behind the cricket club. This work is scheduled for early May. Future planned work includes dead wooding some more of the mature oak trees on the banking and carrying out a Summer tree inspection in August.



The new car park meter has been fitted along with new signage at Crosthwaite road, and includes contactless payments. The car park surface has been sprayed for weeds using Katoun Gold. This contains pelargonic acid to suppress the weeds but will not kill established grass weed. It costs £150.00 per application and can be applied up to 4 times per year. With increased traffic on the car park surface weed control hopefully will be kept to minimum.



Upper Fitz Park

The tennis courts, bowling green and surrounding grassed areas have been aeriated and fertilizer applied. An application of herbicide to control turf weeds has been carried out and scarifying to remove the moss will continue when possible, throughout the season. The tennis courts have been marked out and play will continue under restrictions as provided by LTA.





The spring mining bees are present in the park at the moment and their small entrance holes are visible on the tennis courts and bowling green

A number of Crocus bulbs where planted last Autumn within the shrub beds in the park, unfortunately the rabbits have eaten them as fast as they have grown and no flowers have been present.

Two new gates have been fitted to the site entrance to prevent the public from entering the workshop area. They have now been painted along with the fence and tennis hut.





Rolande Urwin has been and carved an owl in the stump near the compost bays, giving a redundant tree stump a sense of presence. Thank you to Peter Sibley for your kind donation to make this happen and add another piece of interest to the park.

Wellbeing Bunting - Fitz Park

At the Charitable Trust meeting held on 28th May 2020 the following resolution was made: -

Cumbria NHS Wellbeing Service – Wellbeing Bunting
 RESOLVED that the request be approved in principle subject to further information
 regarding the route of the bunting through Fitz Park and agreement of practicalities with the
 Parks Manager, use of recycled material to string the bunting together, an indication of the
 time period for the bunting to be in place and agreement to clear up the bunting at the
 appropriate time.

Due to Covid 19 and work commitments from the NHS staff involved in this project it has been delayed until recently, however we have still been in contact throughout the last 12 months.

The project was set up at the creative wellbeing group in Keswick Hospital and intended to try and break the world record of 12 miles of bunting. Unfortunately, they have been unable to achieve 12 miles but still have a considerable amount to display.

Catherine and I meet with Tracy Williams, Sharon Harrison, and Sarah Linnard from the NHS in Fitz park on Thursday 6th May.

We have agreed with the trusts approval to place the bunting around a section of the CSA fence, along the railing on Station road Lower Fitz park side, a section of the play area fence and with Café Wests agreement on the railings in front of the café.

The bunting is made up of lots of induvial pieces made by local people of all ages though out the last 12 months. Catherine and I were shown some of the samples and they are beautifully, tastefully made in various designs from old clothes, curtains and other recycled material.

We have arranged to put the bunting up on Wednesday 1st September so it can be fully appreciated by Lakeland trails and the Mid-Summer festival. They will supply volunteers to put the putting in place with our guidance and remove it after 6 weeks. Signage will be provided by them to explain the cause of the bunting and its meaning.

Looking After Keswick - Disposable Barbecues

A proposed message from Keswick Town Council, Sustainable Keswick, Keswick Fire Service, KTA, National Trust and the LDNPA

(at the time of writing this report, Fire Service and National Trust have not yet been consulted. Sustainable Keswick and Keswick Tourism Association do support this recommendation)

1. Motion to KTC – raising awareness about the problems of single use barbeques

Every summer we have several fires locally, caused by disposable barbeques. Sometimes these have involved helicopters to extinguish them. In all cases, there has been devastation to wildlife habitats, with nesting sites, peatlands, plants and grasses destroyed.

A recent fire close to Keswick cost around £30,000 to put out – everyone is paying for this, one way or another. Sometimes, the fires don't happen out in the open and it's the rubbish truck which is set on fire by smouldering embers. Imagine being the driver of that truck driving along the A66 with your truck ablaze – both terrifying and extremely dangerous. Curious dogs attracted to the smell, end up with burns and other wildlife get injured on the abandoned metal grids.

We had a fire on Blencathra a few years ago which was caused by a barbecue being thrown into the dry heather. It burned many acres of land and the peat caught fire. The peat is metres deep, once alight it is very difficult to put out at that depth. Then it takes thousands of years to regenerate.

The LDNPA is considering their approach to these items on 19th May and we will have a report from Cllr Lywood on this at our meeting of 20th May, so my recommendation may be adapted according to the results of that motion.

Landowners do have some rights regarding banning the use of barbecues on their land - I will therefore be putting some suggestions on the next Trust agenda.

Recommendation:

Although we have no enforcement powers to control the sale of disposable barbecues, I recommend that we write as a Town Council to local retailers including the fuel stations, asking them to phase out the sale of these items.

We can also suggest that purchaser ID is taken – in the same way as when fireworks are sold. This may not immediately reduce the number of items sold, but it will raise awareness of the issues and is something we can build upon.

2. Sample Proposed Code of Conduct for users to be put on our website and request KTA / VisitAllerdale / Safer Lakes and National Trust do the same.

Disposable barbeques may seem to provide a fun and cheap way to enjoy a meal. They can also cause a lot of damage to our environment.

If you use a disposable barbecue, please consider the following environmental aspects:

Every summer we endure several fires caused by these items – at a high financial cost and having a devasting effect on local wildlife and plantlife. Curious dogs attracted to the smells can end up with burns. If left behind after use, the metal grids are a danger to animals.

They are a single use, non-recyclable item – the environmental impact in terms of their manufacture, packaging and transport, plus the carbon emissions when they are lit and then again when they are burnt as 'refuse derived fuel' outweigh their appeal. If collected from parks and shorelines, they may to go to landfill.

Please do consider other ways to enjoy a meal in the open but if you do choose to use a disposable barbecue, please follow the guidelines below:

If you do use a disposable barbecue

- It must be placed on an even surface, such as either bricks or paving slabs.
- Never light a disposable barbecue on grass or on the fells.
- Do not fan the barbecue as sparks and embers will travel and may start a fire
- Place disposable barbecues well away from accommodation, shed or fences.
- Do not use disposable barbecues near or on public benches, or on picnic tables.
- If you're using a disposable barbecue on a safe surface, make sure it is fully out by pouring sand or water over it

Thank you for looking after this beautiful National Park so that our wildlife can flourish and everyone can enjoy it.

3, Contents of a proposed letter to retailers:

Dear retailer, (insert name)

Keswick Town Council encourages positive action in the prevention of wildfires in the area, caused by disposable barbecues.

At the Keswick Town Council meeting of 20th May 2021, a motion was carried to write to local retailers, discouraging their use.

We do recognise that in summer, these items provide valuable revenue for you. The cost of putting out these fires, however, means that collectively we all pay a very high price for them.

A recent wildfire in Keswick reportedly cost the fire service £30,000 to put out and that is just one fire. Every summer, we have several – last year, there was also a serious fire in a Cumbria rubbish truck which put the driver at extreme risk. Environmentally – the negatives of energy used in producing these single use items and the destruction of plants and wildlife caused, outweigh the short term enjoyment of a cheap disposable barbeque dinner.

We know that you and your teams love the environment here and we encourage you to phase out the sale of these items. In the meantime, we enclose a set of safety measures for users to take and we request that you collect names and addresses of purchasers as with fireworks, in order to encourage their safe use and to assist the local emergency services.

If you do use a disposable barbecue:

- It must be placed on non-flammable surface such as either bricks or paving slabs. Never directly onto grass.
- Never light a disposable barbecue on grass or on the fells
- Place disposable barbecues well away from accommodation, shed or fences.
- Do not use disposable barbecues near or on public benches or picnic tables.
- If you're using a disposable barbecue on a safe surface, make sure it is out by pouring sand or water over it - before putting it in the bin.
- To avoid starting a fire you should allow it to cool for several hours and then consider pouring water over it to make sure it's out.
